Background for Teachers

This is the fourth of four lessons in the Fourth Grade American Indian History Lesson Plan Unit:

AIH-4: Utah Indian - Future Changes

The Indian tribes of Utah have faced many challenges. Their way of life, culture and language have experienced changes since in westward movement of people into Utah. The purpose of this lesson is to have students examine changes the tribes have experienced and then look to the future and predict what changes may occur.

Instructional Procedures

Essential Question:

What changes will come in the future?

Using the <u>Comparison Information chart</u> (pdf), discuss with students the changes the Utah tribes have experienced since the westward movement of pioneers into Utah.

Students will complete the Then and Now Venn Diagram (pdf).

As groups or individuals, students will discuss and share ideas of how they think the Utah Indian tribes will change in the future.
