Understanding your college options

1, 2, 4 or More

What does "college" mean to you? If you think it applies to only four year degree programs, you may be surprised to learn the term also refers to formal education marked by a certificate or associate degree.

Why does it matter? The expanded definition can help people see a wider range of options for achieving a rewarding career.

"Despite evidence to the contrary, some people still believe the only path to a good job is through a Bachelor's degree," says Nicole Batt, director of the Utah College Advising Corps. "And while a Bachelor's is still the best fit for many students—including some who stack certificates and associate degrees to get there—Utah has a wealth of in-demand, high-paying jobs that can be obtained with other post-secondary credentials."

Another misperception is that careers that don't require a Bachelor's degree don't require critical thinking or creativity.

"We see just as wide a range of problem-solving skills in trade careers as we do in other fields," says Kim Herrera, School Counseling Program Specialist at the Utah State Board of Education. "With the definition of college to include one, two, and four-year programs, the key is to determine what is the best fit for you and your future."

Build career success by stacking credentials

A credential is a formally acknowledged level of achievement such as a certificate or college degree. Over the course of your career, you will likely use at least one approach to stacking your credentials:



Stairs: Each credential is designed to build to the next.



Nest: The eggs represent different, independent credentials united by one common theme: *you*.



Cake: When your career is up and running, top it with a certificate to advance even further.

THE UTAH COLLEGE ADVISING CORPS (UCAC)

has successfully helped students navigate the process of getting into college for over 10 years. In 2019, the program expanded to place College Access Advisers in a total of 34 Utah schools. As recent college graduates, College Access Advisers enthusiastically connect high school students with current information about college—which is defined as one, two, four or more years of formal education beyond high school. The program is increasing college enrollment and graduation rates and changing the course of intergenerational poverty.

Paying for College

Utah wants to invest in you! Did you know that last year, 38% of CTE scholarship applicants were awarded tuition benefits and other support for college? You can also take tuition-free courses through any college in the Utah System of Technical Colleges while in high school and, in many cases, beyond. Concurrent Enrollment courses are also a great way to earn credits that count toward high school and college completion. And through your school's CTE program, you could complete a certificate that aligns with a high-demand career, meaning you could graduate from high school with a diploma and a well-paying job.
