My Very Own Talent



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


That Make Me Who I Am Today.




My Name is Susie, and I want to be like everyone else who all seem to be talented in one way or another. Others can sing, or are good at playing soccer, but what is my talent?





The next day, when I got home, I went over to the old piano in our living room with confidence. I had never played the piano before. I opened the sheet music and set it up, though I started to doubt myself.




I asked my mom, who was standing beside me, "Mom, could you help me please?"

"With what?" My mom asked.


"I want to know how to play." I replied.


All the while I practiced and practiced, and listened to my mother's advice, and then practiced some more.
