

## TERMS

### WINDOWS AND WINDOW PARTS:

APRON	The part of the frame below the sill
BAY WINDOW	A bowed or angled window
CASEMENT WINDOW	A moveable window that slides and swings in or swings out
CASING OR JAMB	The depth of the window that fits into the wall
DORMER WINDOW	A window that projects from an alcove in the roof and usually fills up the entire space
DOUBLE HUNG	Made of two sashes which may be raised or lowered
FRAME	The molding that covers the casing and frames the window
JALOUSIE	A window made of adjustable glass louvers that control ventilation
PICTURE WINDOW	A large pane of glass or a fixed pane with moveable side sections
RANCH	Wide windows set high in the wall
SASH	The wood or metal part of a window that holds the glass
SILL	The narrow shelf at the bottom the sash
SLANTING	Windows that follow the line of a slanting roof
CLERESTORY	Windows placed near the top of a wall

### WINDOW TREATMENTS:

BOTTOM UP SHADE	A type of roller shade which pulls up instead of down
CASEMENT FABRIC	Fabric that is heavy enough to be drawn at night for privacy and serve as side draperies during the day
CORNICE	A rigid horizontal heading of wood or metal

<b>CURTAIN</b>	Stationary treatment made of sheet or light weight fabric
<b>DRAPERY</b>	Heavier fabrics—may be stationary or drawn
<b>CASCADE</b>	Softly draped fabric hung at each side of swags
<b>JABOTS</b>	A ruffle or folded fabric placed vertically to separate swags
<b>LAMBREQUIN</b>	A cornice with a highly-curved bottom edge
<b>SEMI SHEERS</b>	Drapery usually used for privacy
<b>SHUTTERS</b>	Made of wood or metal horizontal slats or of panels of fabric which fit inside the window frame
<b>SIDE DRAPERIES</b>	Stationary or hanging draperies that may be left straight or tied back only at the sides of the window
<b>SOFT TREATMENT</b>	Window treatments such as draperies or curtains
<b>STRUCTURAL OR ARCHITECTURAL TREATMENTS</b>	Window treatments such as shutters, blinds, screens, panels, shades, wood valances
<b>SWAGS</b>	A valance made of fabric which is pleated or draped across the top of a window
<b>TIE BACKS</b>	A cord or narrow strip of fabric to hold a drapery back
<b>VALANCE</b>	A fabric heading
<b>VENETIAN BLINDS</b>	Wooden, metal, or plastic strips controlled by turning a rod rather than by pulling a cord (may be vertical or horizontal, wide or narrow)
